

#### Resources sector economic contribution - Burdekin Shire Council - 2013-14

For your information and that of your fellow Councillors and officers, I am pleased to enclose a summary of the economic contribution to Burdekin Shire Council made by Queensland resources sector companies in financial year 2013-14.

This is the fifth edition of the annual QRC economic contribution analysis, which aggregates by postcode resources company spending on wages and salaries, goods and services, and community contributions.

Raw data is translated into a local 'value-add' by economists Lawrence Consulting, who specialise in such work for clients including the Local Government Association of Queensland.

This data is able to be assigned to geographical (e.g. statistical region) and electoral (e.g. local government area) boundaries. This year, the LGA summary also includes the number of local business supported by resources sector spending and local share of the \$2.5 billion in royalties paid to the state government.

In 2013-14, significant spending was identified in 57 Queensland Local Government Areas. Directly, resources companies spent \$37.5 billion in Queensland - with the coal industry contributing 51 percent, oil and gas 36 percent and metals 13 percent.

Importantly, almost 17,000 Queensland businesses supplied goods and services to resource companies and that expenditure is calculated to have generated an all-up 'value-add' for Queensland of \$77.6 billion and 442,000 full-time employment positions. That means that one in four dollars of the Queensland economy and one in five jobs flows from the State's resources sector.

**Dear Councillor Lowis** 

I refer to my letter of 24 September 2014 regarding preparations for the 2016 quadrennial local government elections.

I am aware a number of local governments are considering conducting, or have expressed a desire to conduct, their elections by postal ballot for the whole of the areas.

It is my personal view that attendance voting strengthens the transparency and integrity of the democratic process and has the additional advantage of delivering social benefits to the community. Accordingly, I believe local government elections should be conducted by attendance ballots wherever possible.

Recent amendments to the *Local Government Electoral Act 2011* have made it significantly easier for individual electors who are unable to attend a polling booth on election day to apply to the returning officer to cast a postal vote.

On this basis, unless a local government is able to demonstrate exceptional circumstances exist, I am unlikely to approve an application to conduct the 2016 elections by way of postal ballot for the whole or part of the area.

#### 2014 LGAQ Annual Conference Resolution 95

The Local Government Association of Queensland (LGAQ) held its successful 118<sup>th</sup> Annual Conference in Mackay between 27 – 29 October 2014, with over 350 delegates attending and representing each of the 77 Queensland local governments.

A total of 110 motions were passed at this year's Annual Conference. This includes the following submitted by Burdekin Shire Council:

# 95 - Telecommunications Infrastructure - Investigation into Costs for Works Impacting on Trenches, Pits and Underground Cables

"That the Local Government Association of Queensland investigates the exorbitant costs levied by the Telstra Corporation on local government for performing simple works when adjusting pit heights or cable locations to interface with new or reconstructed Council infrastructure."

The following background information was considered by the Conference in the adoption of this resolution.

Burdekin Shire Council has been expanding its concrete footpath/bikeway network to facilitate safe pedestrian access and encourage residents to engage in physical activity. On numerous occasions Telstra pits are encountered that have subsided and are creating trip/fall hazards, are heavily damaged and dangerous due to lack of any maintenance or inspection regime on the part of Telstra.

Some of these pits have had the Telstra "yellow cages" around them for up to two or three years.

Council as part of a project may require a Telstra pit to be raised or lowered to match the profile height of the new concrete footpath. In most cases, this may involve raising or lowering a pit as little as 100-200mm. Telstra takes these opportunities to upgrade their infrastructure, replacing these damaged asbestos containing pits with new concrete or plastic pits and charging Council up to \$5k for a simple distribution pit. Of course, Telstra increases these costs for larger more complex pits.

Telstra runs a closed shop on any modifications performed on their infrastructure and warns in their standard terms and conditions of the requirement that all access to Telstra's network is to be facilitated by Telstra. Tampering or interfering with telecommunications infrastructure or a facility owned or operated by a carrier (being Telstra) is an offence under the Criminal Code Act 1995. Heavy penalties may be applied for breach of this prohibition.

Enclosed is the response we have received from Mr Frank Vescio, General Manager Infrastructure Industry Solutions, Telstra Global Enterprise and Services. The response also includes direct contact details for Mr Vescio and Mr Fennessy (General Manager Assets Management, Telstra Customer



Service Delivery) as senior Telstra executives that are able to work with councils on complex issues where usual processes have not delivered a satisfactory outcome.

The LGAQ is also continuing to seek clarity from relevant State and Commonwealth agencies regarding recent amendments to the definition of a "work site" that may be resulting in additional costs being borne by Telstra and anecdotally may be passed on to local government when work is required.

#### Re: Telstra Response to 2014 LGAQ Conference - Resolution 95

Thank-you for your letter to Mike Wright dated Wednesday, 10 December outlining a number of concerns. I have attempted to address these for you below.

#### Telstra's pit repair/upgrade program

We acknowledge that when it comes to timeframes for completing pit repairs and pit upgrade work, in some cases we could do better. To address this, Telstra has embarked on a program focused on pit repair and upgrade. We have skilled contractors assisting us with this task and we are committed to continue this program.

The Burdekin Council has specifically raised a concern that Telstra may be upgrading its infrastructure instead of merely raising or lowering the pit by 100-200ml to permit Council footpath work. In fact, Telstra only replaces pits where it is necessary and only on a like-for-like basis.

It is often the case that old asbestos or damaged pits cannot be moved or raised/lowered. They need to be replaced with equivalent plastic pits and the associated cabling may or may not also require replacement as a result.

Telstra carries out this work to allow Council footpath improvement works to proceed. It does not seek to upgrade or improve its network at Council expense.

#### Telstra's contracting model - market competitive to deliver best value

Telstra's pit remediation/ upgrade works are undertaken by Telstra's industry partners and contractors.

Any contractors who want to supply these services to Telstra can submit a capability statement via our website. We undertake regular market testing to ensure our contractors continue to deliver best value across a range of factors including their ability to meet our quality standards and work practices.

For pit remediation activity, compliance to Telstra's ACM (Asbestos Containing Materials) standards is essential. As set out in our ACM policy, given the difficulties associated with identifying asbestos containing material, we take conservative and presumptive approach to the presence of asbestos in pits.

There are currently some 1,400 individual contract resources qualified to undertake such works for Telstra.



#### Project costs

Our experience in managing costs on projects is that advance planning is one of the best ways to minimise costs.

The opportunity here is for councils to work with our regional contacts, as per below, at the start of your planning cycle so that we can provide you with solutions to either prevent certain works occurring or help achieve a better overall cost for your works.

Conversely, when works are fast-tracked this may or may not attract higher industry pricing.
