Dad picks up my cricket bat, and protectively slides in front of me. He quickly whispers in my ear.

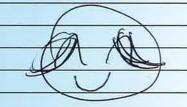
"Run. I'll deal with this man. I know what he wants. I unfortunately have some unfinished business with him. I love you.

Those were the last words I heard from my father. He turns to face the demon man, a defiant expression on his face. And that was the moment that I saw my own father get shot and explode into a million stars.

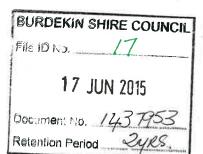

NOTES TO THE FINANCIAL STATEMENTS FOR THE YEAR ENDED 30 APRIL 2015

NOTE 1: Summary of Significant Accounting Policies

a) Basis of Preparation

This financial report is a special purpose financial report prepared in order to satisfy the financial reporting requirements of the Associations Incorporation Act (Qld) 1981. The committee has determined that the association is not a reporting entity. The users of these financial statements are the Management Committee and the Members.

This entity is not for profit and the period of the financial statements is from 1 May 2014 to 30 April 2015. The objectives of the Board are to promote, encourage and extend in the Shire of Burdekin activities of an artistic nature in all their respects.

The financial report has been prepared on an accruals basis and is based on historic costs and does not take into account changing money values.

The entity applies the following accounting standards:

AASB 101 Presentation of Financial Statements

AASB 107 Statement of Cash Flows

AASB 108 Accounting Policies, Changes in Accounting Estimates & Errors

AASB 110 Events After The Reporting Period

Dissolution of Burdekin Cultural Complex Board

In accordance with Ordinary Meeting of the Burdekin Cultural Complex Board of 16 February 2015, the Board ceased trading on the 31 March 2015 and will be deregistered with the Office of Fair Trading after the completion of audit of these financial statements. The management and administration of the venues and all responsibilities of the Board and all assets, liabilities, rights, privileges and property of the Board were transferred to Burdekin Shire Council as of the 1st of April 2015 in accordance with section 32 of the Board's Constitution.

While the Burdekin Cultural Complex Board is no longer considered to be a going concern, the financial statements have been prepared consistent with the going concern basis as the Board's functions will continue to be delivered by the Burdekin Shire Council.

The following significant accounting policies, which are consistent with the previous period unless otherwise stated, have been adopted in the preparation of this financial report.



NOTES TO THE FINANCIAL STATEMENTS FOR THE YEAR ENDED 30 APRIL 2015

b) Employee Benefits

Liabilities are recognised for employee benefits such as wages and salaries, annual leave and long service leave in respect of services provided by the employees up to the reporting date. Liabilities for employee benefits are assessed at each reporting date. Where it is expected that the leave will be paid in the next twelve months the liability is treated as short term liability. Otherwise the liability is treated as long term.

Wages, Salaries and Sick Leave

Wages and salaries due but unpaid at reporting date are recognised in the Statement of Financial Position at the current salary rates in respect of employee's services up to that date.

Sick Leave

Sick leave taken in the future will be met by future entitlements and hence no recognition of accrued sick leave entitlements have been made in these financial statements. No entitlement vests with the employee on termination.

Annual Leave

A liability for annual leave is recognised. Amounts expected to be settled within 12 months are calculated on current wage and salary levels and includes related employee co-costs. Amounts not expected to be settled within 12 months are calculated on projected future wage and salary levels and related employee on-costs, and are discounted to present values.

As the Board does not have an unconditional right to defer this liability beyond 12 months, all annual leave is classified as a current liability.

This liability is reported in note 23 as a payable.

Long Service Leave

A liability for long service leave is measured as the present value of the estimated future cash outflows to be made in respect of services provided by employees up to the reporting date. The value of the liability is calculated using current pay rates and projected future increases in those rates and includes related employee on-costs. The estimates are adjusted for the probability of the employee remaining in the Board's employment or other associated employment which would result in the Board being required to meet the liability. Adjustments are then made to allow for the proportion of the benefit earned to date, and the result is discounted to present value.

Where employees have met the requisite length of service and the Board does not have an unconditional right to defer this liability beyond 12 months, long service leave is classified as a current liability. Otherwise it is classified as non-current.

The liability is reported in notes 24 current liability and 26 non-current liability as a provision.



NOTES TO THE FINANCIAL STATEMENTS FOR THE YEAR ENDED 30 APRIL 2015

Superannuation

The superannuation expense for the reporting period is the amount of the contribution the local government makes to the superannuation plan which provides benefits to its employees.

c) Taxation

Income of the Burdekin Cultural Complex Board is exempt from Commonwealth taxation under provisions of the Income Tax Assessment Act. The Board is subject to Fringe Benefit Tax and Goods and Services Tax ('GST').

d) Revenue and Other Income

Revenue is measured at the fair value of the consideration received or receivable after taking into account any trade discounts and volume rebates allowed. For this purpose, deferred consideration is not discounted to present values when recognising revenue.

Interest revenue is recognised using the effective interest rate method.

Grants, contributions, donations and gifts that are non-reciprocal in nature are recognised as revenue in the year in which the Board obtains control over them. Where grants are received that are reciprocal in nature, revenue is recognised over the term of the funding arrangements.

All revenue is stated net of the amount of goods and services tax (GST).

e) Cash

For the purpose of the Statement of Financial Position and the Statement of Cash Flows, cash assets include all cash and cheques receipted but not banked as well as deposits at call with financial institutions and cash on hand.

f) Economic Dependency

The Board received grant funding from the Burdekin Shire Council ("Council") to help meet administrative and promotional costs. The level of grant funding received by the Board is based on the Board's budget for the respective year. Under the terms of the management agreement between Board and the Council there is no guarantee that the Council will fund any costs in excess of the initial budget.

The Board is therefore dependent on the continued support of the Council in order to satisfy both budgeted and non-budgeted expenditure.



NOTES TO THE FINANCIAL STATEMENTS FOR THE YEAR ENDED 30 APRIL 2015

g) Receivables

Trade debtors are recognised at the amounts due at the time of sale or service delivery i.e. the agreed purchase/contract price. Settlement of these amounts is required within 30 days from invoice date.

h) Property, plant and equipment

Plant and equipment are measured on the cost basis.

The carrying amount of plant and equipment is reviewed annually by management to ensure it is not in excess of the recoverable amount from these assets. The recoverable amount is assessed on the basis of the expected net cash flow that will be received from the asset's employment and subsequent disposal. The expected net cash flows have been discounted to their present values in determining recoverable amounts.

Depreciation

The depreciable amount of all fixed asses, is depreciated on a straight-line basis over the asset's useful life to the Board commencing from the time the asset is held ready for use.

The depreciation rates used for each asset is:

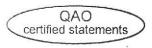

The assets' residual values and useful lives are reviewed and adjusted if appropriate, at the end of each reporting period. The residual values and useful lives are disclosed in note 22.

An asset's carrying amount is written down immediately to its recoverable amount if the asset's carrying amount is greater than its estimated recoverable amount.

Gains and losses on disposals are determined by comparing proceeds with the carrying amount. These gains or losses are included in the statement of comprehensive income.



NOTES TO THE FINANCIAL STATEMENTS FOR THE YEAR ENDED 30 APRIL 2015

i) Payables

Trade Creditors are recognised upon receipt of goods or services ordered and are measured at the agreed purchase/contract price net of applicable discounts. Amounts owing are unsecured and are generally settled on 30 day terms.

j) Goods and Services Tax (GST)

Revenues, expenses and assets are recognised net of the amount of GST, except where the amount of GST is not recoverable from the Tax Office. In these circumstances, the GST is recognised as part of the cost of acquisition of the asset or as part of an item of the expense. Receivables and payables in the statement of financial position are shown inclusive of GST.

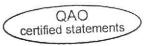
k) Comparative Figures

Amounts included in the financial statements are in Australian dollars and have been rounded to the nearest \$1.

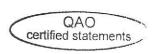

The preparation of financial statements necessarily requires the determination and use of certain critical accounting estimates, assumptions and management judgements that have the potential to cause a material adjustment to the carrying amounts of assets and liabilities within the next financial year. Such estimates, judgements and underlying assumptions are reviewed on an ongoing basis. Revisions to accounting estimates are recognised in the period in which the estimate is revised and in future periods as relevant.

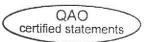

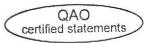

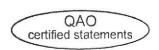

The cash transferred to Burdekin Shire Council on 30 April 2015 totalled \$52,995.

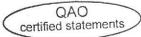

- (b) in my opinion the financial report presents fairly, in all material respects, the financial position of Burdekin Cultural Complex Board Inc. as at 30 April 2015, and its financial performance and cash flows for the year then ended in accordance with the accounting policies described in Note 1 and the financial reporting requirements of the Associations Incorporation Act (Qld) 1981.

Emphasis of Matter - Wind-up of Burdekin Cultural Complex Board Inc.

Without modifying my opinion, attention is drawn to Note 1 in the financial report which identifies that pursuant to a Board's resolution of 16 February 2015, the Board ceased trading on 31 March 2015 and all assets, liabilities, rights, privileges and property of the Board were transferred to Burdekin Shire Council as of 1 April 2015. Accordingly, this final financial report has been prepared on a basis that is consistent with a going concern basis. The Burdekin Shire Council is responsible for finalising the wind up and deregistering the association.

Emphasis of Matter - Basis of Accounting

Without modifying my opinion, attention is drawn to Note 1 to the financial report, which describes the basis of accounting. The financial report has been prepared for the purpose of fulfilling the Management Committee's financial reporting responsibilities under the Associations Incorporation Act (Qld) 1981. As a result, the financial report may not be suitable for another purpose.

Local government records are to be kept in accordance with the requirements of the Queensland Public Records Act 2002. This includes records created by elected members.

The Local Government Sector Retention and Disposal Schedule covers records created, received or kept by mayors and councillors in their official capacity including official work diaries. It does not cover records such as personal emails and information relating to political parties generated by mayors and councillors when they are not acting in their official capacity.

Elected members are reminded that there are identified record keeping requirements related to diaries, with councillor diaries to be retained by the council for seven years and indefinitely for mayors.

Queensland State Archives has developed a factsheet that deals specifically with diaries of elected members.

With local government elections scheduled for March 2016, councils are encouraged to ensure that processes are put in place to collect diaries from elected members where these documents exist.

The Board agreed to a small increase in the Council levies to be paid to the North Queensland Sports Foundation, as flagged in the letter dated 20 April 2015. The levies have been increased to 22.52c (from 22.14c) per capita, based on the most recent census (2011). This represents an increase of 1.7%, in line with CPI.

For the 2015/2016 financial year, the levy for your Council will be \$3909.92 plus GST of \$390.99, making a total of \$4300.91.

An invoice for this amount has been included with this letter.

State Government meetings

North Queensland Sports Foundation Directors have been lobbying their local State Members for support, highlighting the disparity in funding to North Queensland sportsmen and women. The North Queensland Sports Foundation presently serves 725,000 people living in our region, and continues to strive to best serve our members and the communities' interests.

We are pursuing operational funding under State Government Programs for 2016 and beyond, urging all Members to continue to speak with local State Government members to continue the conversation which will culminate in a proposal in October.

Presently we are only sustained via Member (Council) contributions and sponsorship as we are not deemed a peak body. Our aim is to challenge this outdated moniker thus making the Foundation eligible for Government Funding.

Kick Off for New Board

The North Queensland Sports Foundation (NQSF) has welcomed the approval of major reforms which bring it in line with the mainstream Sports and Council governance principles.

extraordinary general meeting of NOSF members held in Townsville agreed to a new constitution for the long term governance of the Foundation, resulting in the organisation becoming a company limited by guarantee with a smaller, skills-based board and a new Chairperson.

Chairperson Clr Pat Ernst commented that the sweeping changes, which have been worked upon since an internal review first conducted in July 2014, are a sign that the North Queensland Sports Foundation is embracing the change, which is evidenced by the organisational restructure and governance reform agenda that has made significant progress in just over 6 months.

"The Foundation was originally set up in 1983 and has serviced North Queensland Sportsmen and Women remarkably well over the last thirty years through the North Queensland Games. Great Western Games, Sports Education Tours, and Bursary Programs which have assisted over 250 juniors to the value of over a quarter of a millions dollars. This new direction is to make the Foundation even more relevant, pro-active, and a more cost effective organisation exemplifying contemporary board practices," he said.

One of the major changes is the adoption of a seven person Board which will replace the present structure. This group will represent Member Councils of North Queensland and individual Foundation members. The addition of up to two independent Directors will address any skill shortages thus assisting the Board to make decisions in a timely and highly informed way.

NQSF Chief Executive Officer Andrew Bligh said these changes were significant for the Foundation and sport in North Queensland, as it embarks on a period of consolidation following recent challenges with funding and operational change.

Other adjustments which are now encompassed via the adoption of a new constitution include use of technology to decrease costs to Councils, and a more inclusive consultative process for all members to have their views shared throughout the Foundation. This ability will enable the Foundation Board to be more in tune with what support is required for sports, in all regions of the Foundation footprint. Currently the NQSF services all areas North to Cooktown, West to Mount Isa and South to Sarina.

Cairns Region to host biggest regional sporting games

It's time for the Cairns Region to take its marks as the countdown officially commences for North Queensland's biggest sporting event.

Cairns and the surrounding regions of Mareeba Shire, Tablelands and Douglas will host the 2016 RACQ North Queensland Games from 24-26 June, 2016 which will see over 5,000 participants take part in more than 40 sports over three days.

The event is the largest regional multi-event sporting games in Australia and is set to be bigger than ever in 2016.

North Queensland Sports Foundation Chairman Cr Pat Ernst recently commented that there was already extensive planning underway ahead of the Games.

Cairns Regional Council has already earmarked funding for the event through its Council processes plus additional waiver of venue hire fees in support of the event.

The North Queensland Sports Foundation CEO Andrew Bligh believes the event is shaping up to be one of the best games since the inception of the concept in 1984.

"The range of sports being offered will guarantee there will be something for everyone in the

community," Bligh said, "it is shaping up to be a wonderful community event from 24-26 June 2016

RACQ continues to support the iconic North Queensland sporting festival. RACQ has been the naming rights sponsor of the Games since 2012 and is committed to supporting next year's Games in Cairns.

The North Queensland Games commenced in 1984 and has seen more than 100,000 athletes participate over that time. The Games are now held every two years on rotation between Townsville, Cairns and Mackay. The 2016 event will be the 17th instalment of the Games and the fifth time being held in the Cairns region.

Events will take place at a range of Cairns, Tablelands, Mareeba and Douglas venues.

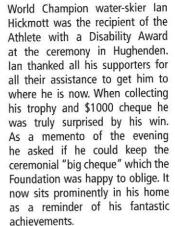

Townsville's Iconic "Red Track" to be upgraded

The State Government has announced it will commit up to \$1.2 million to replace the ageing track at the Townsville Sports Reserve, with the work expected to be finished in the middle of the year.

The track attracts athletes from around the region, while about 45 elite athletes from the Australian youth team are also planning to hold a camp in the city before heading off to the World Championships.

"This track is internationally certified. That certification means we get certain events and certain athletes come here," Mr Mullins of Athletics NQ said.

"If the track deteriorated any more, it would lose its certification because of problems with it."

State Sports Minister Bill Byrne, who announced the project, said he expected the work to begin this month and be finished before the busy second half of the year. "I am pleased to be able to deliver the wonderful news to the people of Townsville that this government is delivering a new world class athletics track for people of all ages to use and enjoy," he said. "The Townsville Sports Reserve is an integral part of the Townsville sporting community attracting over 50,000 participants annually and the athletics track is a big component of that use.

"We have a special facility here in Townsville and the track has been down quite a long time and it's come to the end of its life."

Townsville Sports Reserve manager Denis Russell said the track needed to be repaired to maintain its international standard.

"The average life is around about 15-20 years and it was last refurbished in 2001... so we're in the scale of that," he said.

"It just came to the stage where we said we need to put it in a submission and asked the department whether there were some dollars we could allocate to it. It's all happened in the last three months and it's been very quick.

"It needs to happen very quick because we've got an extraordinary amount of usage coming up with schools and regular user groups like the NQ Fury, Rugby League and Rugby Union competitions."

Work has begun on the replacing of the running surface with the removal of the old track already complete. Pending weather the track, which will be the same colour as previously, is anticipated to be ready for a mid-July start.

Dear Mayor

I had the pleasure of opening the Australian Local Government Association's (ALGA) National General Assembly in Canberra on Monday 15 June 2015 where I spoke about the Australian Government's commitment to Local Government.

One year after we announced a record \$50 billion investment in infrastructure, the Government is getting on with the job of improving road and freight rail links in every state and territory – projects in the biggest cities and small local communities.

The 2015-16 Budget demonstrates this Government's continued commitment to working with Local Government to deliver the infrastructure and services you require for more prosperous communities. I encourage you to use the additional funding provided in the 2015-16 Budget this year.

Councils are the biggest winners from the Government's reintroduction of indexation of fuel excise. The Government will provide an additional \$1.105 billion in funding for the Roads to Recovery Programme over the next two years from the proceeds of the indexation – \$300 million in 2015-16 and \$805 million in 2016-17. This means local governments across Australia will receive an extra \$300 million in 2015-16, on top of the already doubled \$700 million you are receiving this year. In 2016-17, local governments will receive an extra \$805 million in addition to the \$350 million you were scheduled to receive. In 2017-18, the Roads to Recovery Programme will revert to its base funding of \$350 million.

The Government's commitment to the Roads to Recovery Programme and Local Government is demonstrated in the Government's *National Land Transport Act 2014*. We have increased the level of funding and the Programme is permanent – something

The increased funding will be distributed to Councils according to the usual formulae and there will be no requirement for Councils to match this extra money.

This major boost to local road construction and maintenance reflects the importance the Australian Government places on building last mile infrastructure for the future of our nation.

At the ALGA National General Assembly I announced that Round Two of the \$300 million Bridges Renewal Programme will be available exclusively to Local Government. Up to \$100 million will be provided to Local Government for the repair and replacement of local bridges to deliver better transport links for their communities and industries. Applications will be open on 1 July 2015 and close on 31 August 2015. I was pleased that ALGA President Mayor Troy Pickard welcomed the Government's moves to ensure this much needed funding hits the ground where it is most needed.

From 2015-16 an additional \$200 million has been committed by the Government over the next two years under the \$500 million Black Spot Programme to further reduce crashes on Australian roads. The Government has also committed \$200 million under the Heavy Vehicle Safety and Productivity Programme over five years providing councils with funding for important local infrastructure. I strongly encourage local governments to submit their applications to these important programmes.

Local governments are also encouraged to apply for Round Two of the \$1 billion National Stronger Regions Fund to deliver priority infrastructure projects in disadvantaged communities. The guidelines have been revised to give the programme broader reach to Local Government by allowing two applications to be submitted in each round and by quarantining \$25 million for projects worth less than \$1 million. Round Two is currently open and closes on 31 July 2015.

I regret to say that the quality of applications under Round One of both the National Stronger Regions Fund and the Bridges Renewal Programme was in some instances disappointing. Many good projects were undersold or ruled ineligible – often because questions were not answered, evidence was not provided, matching funding was not confirmed or projects were simply not eligible. To address this issue I have tasked Regional Development Australia (RDA) Committees to work closely with local government and industry to develop robust proposals that will support economic development in their region. I encourage councils to seek feedback on their applications from my Department and to work with their RDA Committees to enhance the quality of their funding proposals for subsequent rounds.

The Government's decision to temporarily pause the Financial Assistance Grant indexation was an unpopular one, and it was not one the Government wanted to take. However, when elected the Government inherited \$123 billion of cumulative deficits. The Government has undertaken the only responsible action in the circumstances and has succeeded in reducing that deficit by \$41 billion. The indexation pause has contributed to the important task of budget repair; however, there is still a long way to go. The pause is temporary and Councils will still receive \$9.45 billion across the forward estimates. Additionally, to ensure Councils have immediate access to untied funding to spend according to their local priorities, the first two 2015-16 quarterly Financial Assistance Grant payments have been brought forward. Councils will receive their payments from the week commencing 29 June 2015.

These programmes, along with other initiatives will help ensure councils have access to the funding they need to build the infrastructure they require. A list of Government investment programmes available to Local Government is included for your reference.

Over the months and years ahead, we are determined to strengthen the Budget and the economy so that all Australians benefit through more jobs and greater prosperity.

This Government's commitment to Local Government goes beyond providing financial support. There is now a once in a generation opportunity for us to rethink the way we as governments do business and serve our communities. The Government is providing the forum to discuss change through our White Papers on the Reform of the Federation and Taxation.

Our Federation has served our national well for over 100 years and shown some flexibility to deal with issues of concern over the years. But the balance of constitutional responsibility and revenue raising capability has become increasingly grotesque. Reforming the Federation is vital if we are to deliver our publicly funded services to the Australian people more effectively, more efficiently and more fairly.

I encourage all local governments to provide submissions and comments as part of the consultative processes in the development of the Green and White Papers.

Australian Government investment programmes available to local government

Bridges Renewal Programme

The Bridges Renewal Programme will improve the economic capacity of bridges and access for local communities, by investing \$300 million over four years from 2015–16 to renew our nation's dilapidated bridges. Successful Round One projects were announced in February 2015. Nationally, 73 proposals for Australian Government funding of \$114.8 million were approved. Round Two will be exclusively available to Local Government meaning up to \$100 million will be provided for the repair and replacement of local bridges. Applications for Round Two of the programme will open on 1 July and close on 31 August.

Black Spot Programme

The Black Spot programme will continue to reduce crashes on our roads, with \$60 million allocated annually to target dangerous areas where crashes regularly occur on local roads. The Australian Government is almost tripling its funding for the Black Spot programme for the next two years with an extra \$100 million being allocated in 2015–16 and 2016–17 to accelerate road safety improvements.

Heavy Vehicle Safety and Productivity Programme

The Heavy Vehicle Safety and Productivity Programme will continue to fund infrastructure projects across Australia to improve the productivity and safety outcomes of heavy vehicle operations. The Australian Government has committed a further \$200 million from 2014–15 to 2018–19. Funding of \$96 million for 53 projects under Round Four of the Programme was announced in March 2015. Round 5 will be announced later in 2015.

Roads to Recovery Programme

The expanded \$3.2 billion Roads to Recovery Programme will continue to support the construction and maintenance of local roads by councils. The Government will provide an additional \$1.105 billion in funding for the Roads to Recovery Programme over the next two years – \$300 million in 2015-16 and \$805 million in 2016-17. This means Councils across Australia will receive an extra \$300 million in 2015-16, on top of the already doubled \$700 million they are receiving this year. In 2016-17, local governments will receive an extra \$805 million in addition to the \$350 million they were already scheduled to receive. More than 2,300 projects have already been listed for funding under the current 2014–2019 programme. The Roads to Recovery Programme operates uniformly across Australia. Under current arrangements, each council is guaranteed a share of the total available funding.

National Stronger Regions Fund

The National Stronger Regions Fund will begin from 2015–16, with the first 51 successful projects to support economic and infrastructure projects in regional communities; from freight and transport projects to convention centres and major multi-purpose sports facilities. \$1 billion is available under the Fund for community projects over five years. The guidelines have been revised to give the programme broader reach to Local Government by allowing two applications to be submitted in each round and by quarantining \$25 million for projects worth less than \$1 million. Round Two is currently open and closes on 31 July 2015. This is on top of the over \$300 million invested in Community Development Grants for 300 projects in local communities.

Stronger Communities Fund

The Australian Government's new Stronger Communities Programme will provide \$45 million over two years to fund small capital projects in local communities. Commencing in 2015–16, grants of between \$1,000 and \$20,000 will be made available to reputable, not-for-profit organisations.

Beef Roads

The new \$100 million Northern Australia Beef Roads Fund will work with the northern jurisdictions, transport and industry experts to improve the productivity and resilience of cattle supply chains in northern Australia by funding targeted upgrades to key roads necessary for transporting cattle in the north. The initiative will draw on CSIRO modelling and will commence in July 2015 terminating in June 2019.

Northern Australia: Our North, Our Future

The White Paper delivers an initial investment of \$1.2 billion. This is in addition to the \$5 billion Northern Australia Infrastructure Facility to provide concessional finance for infrastructure projects in the north. The Government will support the development of more water resources in the north by establishing a \$200 million Water Infrastructure Development Fund. Further, the Government will focus on funding high priority infrastructure through additional initiatives including:

- a new \$600 million roads package to improve key roads in the north, including consideration
 of upgrades for the Arnhem, Barkly, Flinders, Great Northern, Savannah and Hann highways,
 the Outback Way and the Tanami Road;
- investing \$39.6 million to upgrade airstrips and subsidise air services in remote Australia; and
- investing \$5 million in rail freight analyses starting with a pre-feasibility analyses of the Mount Isa to Tennant Creek railway and an upgrade of the Townsville to Mount Isa line.

Drought Relief

A \$333 million drought relief package was announced by the Prime Minister ahead of the budget including:

- \$35 million for "shovel-ready" local infrastructure and employment projects
- \$26 million for the control of weeds and animal pests such as wild dogs
- \$20 million for social and community programs and improving mental health
- An extra \$250 million in concessional loans

Financial Assistance Grant Programme

The Financial Assistance Grant programme is provided under the *Local Government (Financial Assistance) Act 1995* (the Act) and has the following components:

- a general purpose component, which is distributed between the states and territories according to population; and
- an identified local road component, which is distributed between the states and territories according to fixed historical shares.

Both components of the grant are untied allowing councils to spend the funds according to local priorities.
